Lisa Haynes, The Garage

- Blackthorn Haven Teens experiencing homelessness will access services at the Blackthorn drop-in center located in central Issaquah. The drop-in center will offer food, clothing, showers, phones, storage for belongings, a washing machine and dryer, desks, supplies for completing homework, and recreation with peers. Most importantly, full-time counselors and full-time case workers will be available to assess students' needs and begin working immediately to locate housing and resources for teens and, possibly, for their families. Counselors will emphasize family reconciliation as appropriate, or alternate housing as necessary.

Issaquah School District Updates

Superintendent Heather Tow-Yick and Marcel Hauser

- Here to share updated strategic plan updates, along with priority and goals for next few years.
 - Goal is to bring together voices, inputs, receiving robust info needed as precursor to launch.
 - Raising concerns in a gentle way. What might be missing and supportive for our directions, enabling us to relook at process.
 - Build sandboxes, which puts relationships first and Transactions second.
 - Start with data review: gather information, leadership interviews, and data.
 - Workshops and engagement codesign, allotting 3 years to design going forward.
 - Create plan + work plans underneath. Progress monitor.
 - We're here, and doing the internal work; detail planning; finalizing for March 2023 presentation.
 - Processes
 - Interviewing student, staff, parent groups, along with ISD leadership.
 - Original draft of the ISD Vision includes 75% of provided Stakeholders input. Exit ticket gathering. Sending out thought exchange. Crowd source. Early preview. Unroll on March 1, 2023. Go back to thought exchange to refine. Two votes. (handout)
 - Two Handouts: (1) Core Aligned, 6 pages, highlighting 5 buckets; (2) Student Wellbeing flyer.
 - Sampling of what we heard:
 - Not representative of all, but best we could.
 - Plug students into existing supports.

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- Goal metrics strategy.
- Goal (1) includes metrics strategy.
- Goals (2) draft and current metric is numerical representational of goal.
 - How to measure; what are things we can do, strategies. Move needle on content. Repeating

Activity: In teams, answer the following questions: What barriers do we need to overcome to make our new vision a reality? What should ISD do that hasn't been done before? What are you excited about with our strategic planning?

Group #1: We would like to see all the different groups represented when listening to student input; funding would be needed to conquer many of the goals everyone's described; great need for mental health services and professionals throughout the district, along with PBSES, inconsistent grading, materials, training, policies become barriers, especially with multiple kids, busy schedules, lack of understandings; district wide teachers should all be in alignment with courses, expectations, and outcomes. The district needs to work on finding ways to retain staff, including benefits, salary, reimbursement for Master's degrees, affordable housing programs housing programs.

Group #2: These conversations are happening everywhere. The thought process needs a refresher; diversify retainment and hiring practices. Barriers: Student individuality, meeting students where they are, challenging with large numbers and staff turnover - One in many. ISD needs to look towards achieving goals, and not making bar so low to meet percentage or data points, but real learning and achievements. Stop the mentality of "Check each box". Opportunities for all, AND, it's okay to veer off path. GE. Much fewer opportunities for students stuck in the middle. Pilot training is not able to merge with high school plans. We desperately need more pockets of alternatives for students because no one really fits in the box. Kids are exhausted trying to be something they will never be. Goal – 4-year college, not accessible for all. Market/ advertise alternative high school beyond planning.

Group #3: We're excited for new academic opportunities – getting kids up to speed, especially after the past few years. The numbers of students who need catch-up services is greater than reported. Academic barriers: equitable and equal resources. The needs vary across the district, for example 5th grade camp... who in ISD pays when kids who can't afford, or parents are too stretched? Not all schools have same courses, services, supports, gradebooks, classroom instruction and content. (Maywood does not provide language courses. Cougar Mountain does not offer yearbook. Woodshop classes are only offered at HIS, when all students can benefit from these skills.) Students experiencing disabilities, have greater needs, including those currently working with 504 and IEPs. Consider resource sharing or equitable offerings. Students need alternative pathways for individual success. Running start, in person vs online. Normalize alternative experiences, such as vocational and visibility.

Group #4: I believe families are unaware of resources. There's stigma, requirements, language barriers, cultural beliefs, all creating an environment where it's difficult for families to ask for help. They just give up. Many new languages within the schools. Lack of awareness. ISD needs to develop strategies for more/smarter multi-cultural involvement and connection, also creating opportunities to foster interest. In gathering thoughts and data, use more diverse practices to work with families who feel left out of process, "Method-diverse ways to collect information to diversity." Nontypical methods. Outreach efforts need great change at the school level. Big differences between school board, superintendent, principal, teacher. Bridge the gap.

Group #5: District-wide uniformity, equitable programming, and outreach. "Angel" programs need to exist at all schools, with standardized processes, low barriers, incorporating appropriate cultural understanding. Free or reduced lunches to all students. Academic opportunity. budget for equitable resources, training, curriculum supports materials for families, neuro diverse individuals, teachers. Our district is becoming a minority majority, and policies, staff should reflect our diverse nature by looking within our community. Language-specific engagement opportunities, new innovative ways to learn more from resident stakeholders.
